One Way To Make a Barn Quilt

Materials needed:

³/₄" MDO plywood (exterior grade)

High quality semi-gloss or high gloss exterior latex paint in bright and bold colors

Foam rollers and brushes

Painter's tape

Sandpaper

Quilt block design

Tools for drawing grid and quilt design

Steps:

1. Cut a sheet of medium density overlay (MDO) plywood to desired size. MDO is recommended for exterior use.

2. Sand all four edges of plywood.

3. Apply 2 generous coats of paint to back and edges allowing ample time to dry between coats. Allow to dry overnight.

4. Apply 2 coats of paint to front and edges in background color using foam brush. Allow to dry overnight.

5. Mark a grid on front using pencil. Example: 9 square or 16 square as appropriate. If a border is desired mark the border first and then mark the grid inside the border.

6. Draw selected quilt block pattern on grid.

7. Tape the pattern with painter's tape to ensure straight lines.

8. Apply 2 or more coats of colored paint to create solid blocks of color. A sealant is not recommended by the paint distributor. If repainting is required the original paint will not need to be stripped.

9. Attach barn quilt to building using screws or French cleats.

The Sheldon Raiders shared their success story with a group in Richford, then Enosburg, Franklin and beyond. This created an explosion of barn quilts which has blanketed Franklin, County and has seeped into nearby counties.
